Answer each of the following questions as succinctly and as scholarly as possible. Please typewrite all written assignments.

- 1. Use the story of the woman who anointed Jesus' feet with costly ointment in identifying several characters of a worshiper.
- 2. Name six hindering attitudes in worship.
- 3. Our foremost reason for worship is to minister unto the Lord, which is the "vertical aspect." Name three reasons we minister to the Lord in congregational worship.
- 4. The horizontal aspect of congregational worship is important. Give four considerations in which this is true in reaching out to others through worship.
- 5. Name five inner ramifications of congregational worship. In other words, how can the worship of God affect us inwardly?
- 6. Give a definition of "moving prophetically" in worship.
- 7. Name three ways a church can function prophetically in worship.
- 8. Explain what is meant by worship being the "language of love."
- 9. The term "song of the Lord" has been used widely to refer to "prophetic song." What is a prophetic song?
- 10. The apostle Paul referred to an element of prophetic worship when he mentioned "psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs." Give a definition for each element of psalm, hymn, and spiritual song.
- 11. Give five positive guidelines to follow in functioning in the realm of prophecy.
- 12. Give a brief description of the function of music during the Patristic Period of church history (A.D. 95-600). Include a brief discussion of the controversy over the use of Psalms as compared to the use of humanly-composed hymns.
- 13. Describe the role of music during the Medieval period (A.D. 600-1517) by comparing this period with Psalm 137.
- 14. Discuss Martin Luther and John Calvin's roles in the restoration of music during the Reformation Period (A.D. 1517-1600).
- 15. Discuss Isaac Watts, John Wesley, and Charles Wesley's roles during the Post-Reformation period (A.D. 1600-1800).
- 16. Discuss the style of music characterized by the Pentecostal and Charismatic Renewal.
